| <p>To borrow for free: Your local public library catalog such as the Columbus Metropolitan Library catalog</p> <p>To buy: An online bookseller like Amazon or Barnes and Noble.</p> <p>Note: E-Books are included in both library catalogs and online bookseller sites.</p> | <p>To find articles in a magazine that pertain to a topic of interest:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use a search engine like Google Note: Articles will be mixed in with websites, blogs and all other sorts of resources. There is no good way to filter out resources that are not popular magazine articles. • Use an article database like Academic Search Complete. Note: This and other databases like it usually have to be accessed through your public or academic library card. Popular and scholarly articles will be retrieved together, but it is possible to filter out scholarly articles. <p>To read a current issue of a magazine, use Google to see if it is online. If not, popular magazines are carried by public libraries (for free access) or drug stores and bookstores for a fee.</p> | <p>There are dozens of ways to search for articles in newspapers. To search within a particular newspaper, try going to the online site of the newspaper and see if there is an option to search its archive.</p> <p>To search by topic for newspaper articles from the past, you should check with your public or academic librarian for help on where to look. Often, these are published by trade organizations or associations. To identify titles:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Google Note: search as follows: • Magazines for scientists • Magazines for teachers, etc. <p>Visit the website of a known association or society to find out what magazine they publish</p> <p>To find articles by subject, use the instructions for popular magazines.</p> | <p>There are dozens of ways to search for articles in newspapers. Most journals and other databases will only be available to you for free through an academic library.</p> <p>A good general use database is Academic Search Complete. Most other databases are geared to a particular academic discipline (health, psychology, literature, etc.). To access these:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Check your academic library website. • Check your large public library. • Ask a librarian for help. | <p>There are dozens of ways to search for articles in newspapers.
